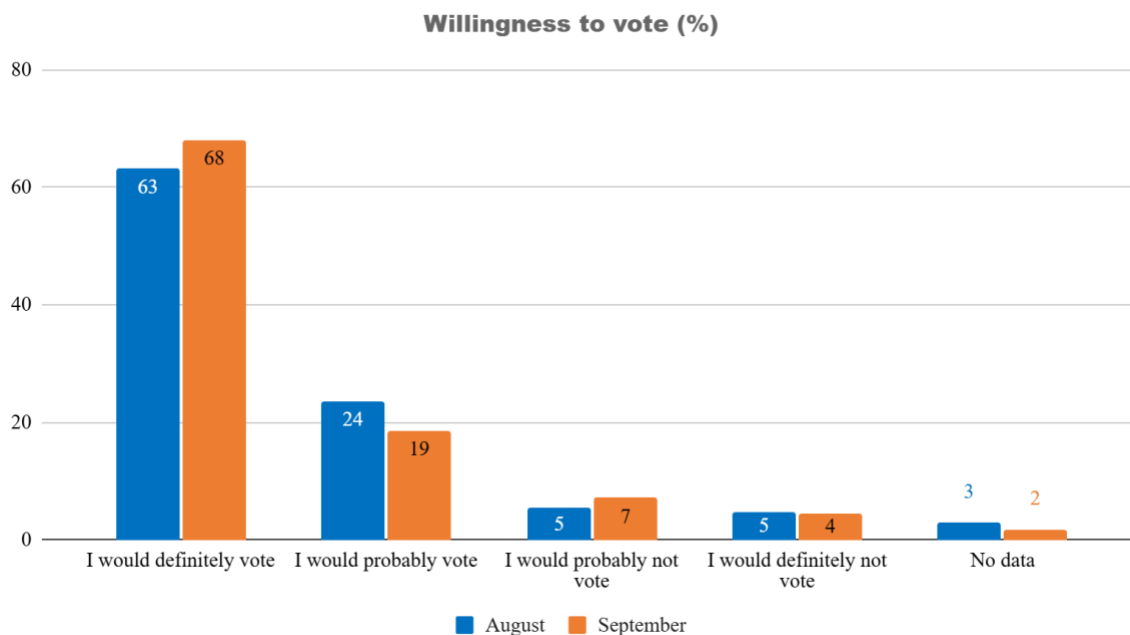

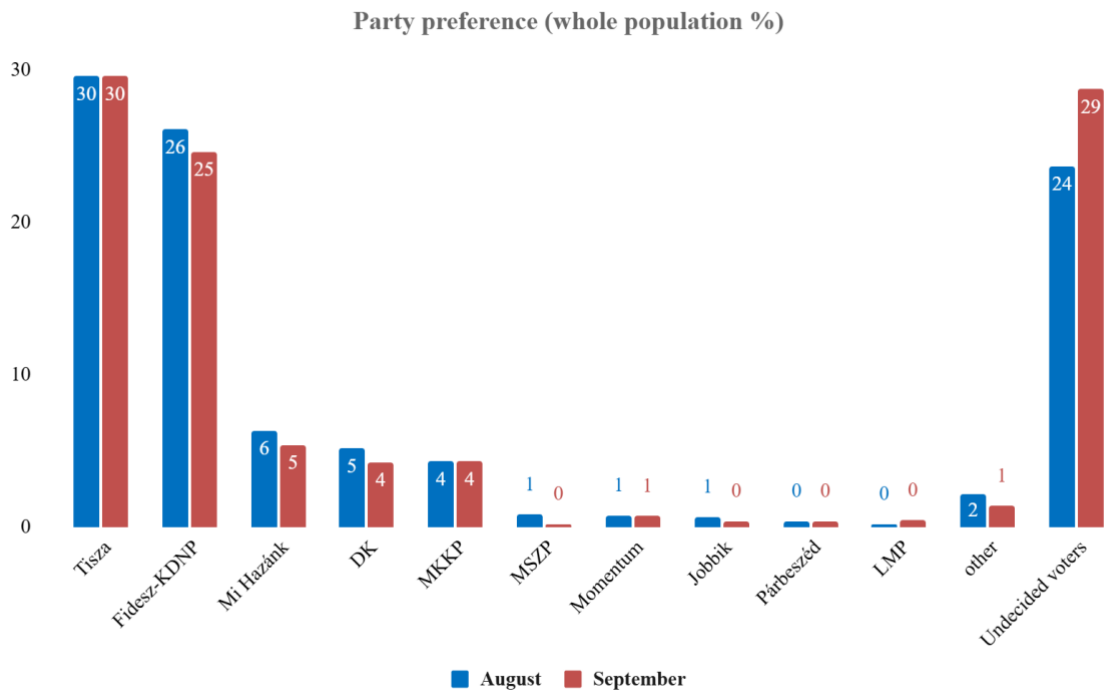
RESULTS

- At the end of September, the **Tisza** Party is ahead of **Fidesz-KDNP** by 5 percentage points among the entire population, the score is 30-25. Péter Magyar's party leads by 6 percentage points among party voters and by 7 percentage points among decided voters, after gaining momentum within the margin of error. Among party voters the score is 41-35 in favor of Tisza while among decided voters it is 43-35.

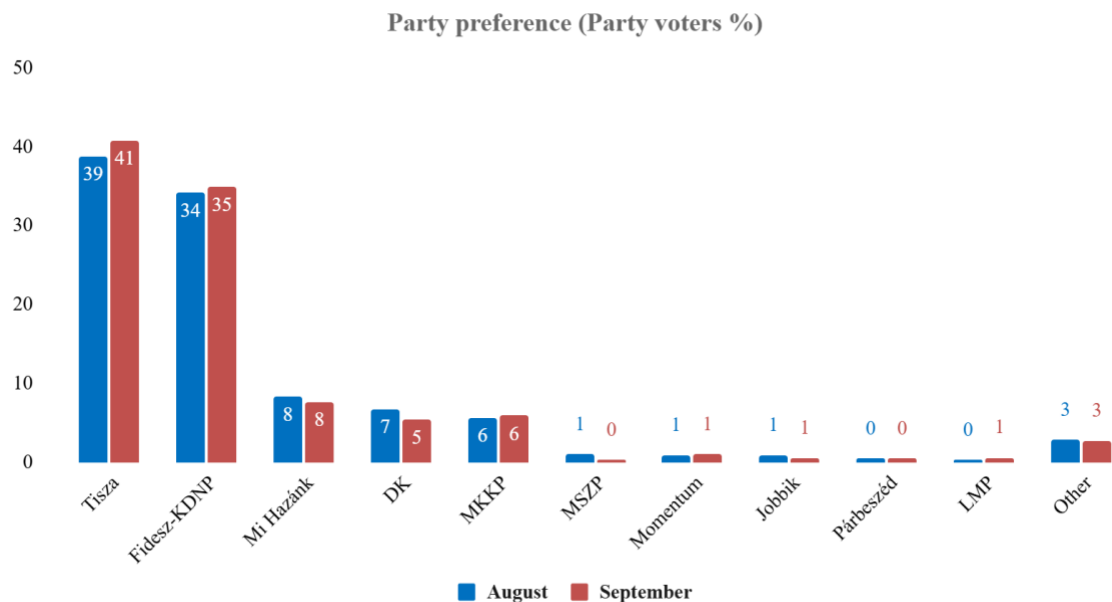


- Mi Hazánk (Our Homeland)** remains the third strongest party, its popularity has declined by 1 percentage point among the whole population, currently 5 percent would vote for the party. 8 percent support the party both among party voters and decided voters, as such it would receive enough votes to get into the

Parliament.

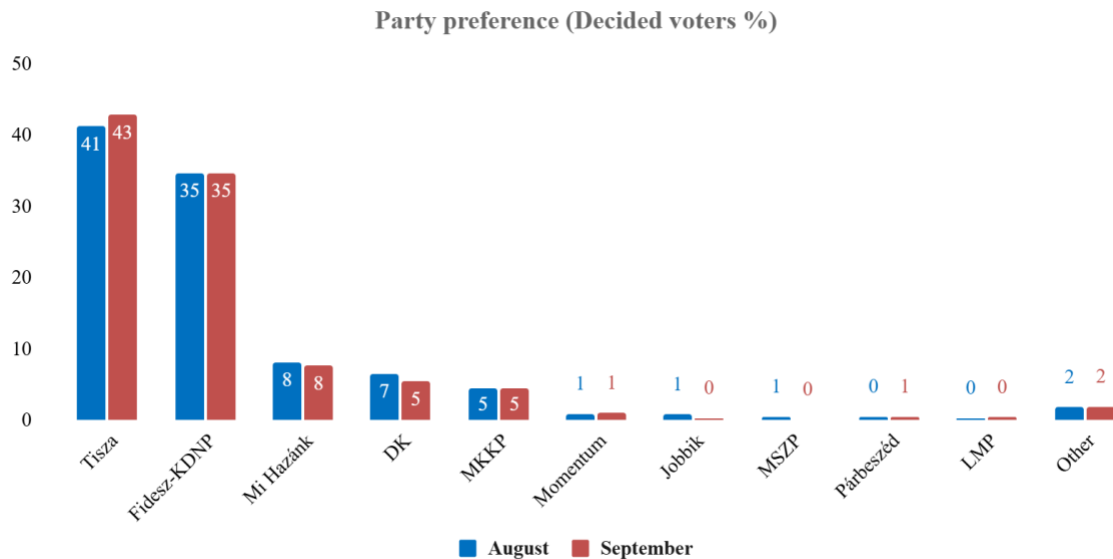


- The **DK's** support has slightly declined in September, by 1 percentage point among the whole population and by 2 percentage points among party voters and decided voters.



- **Kutyapárt's (Magyar Kétfarkú Kutyapárt-MKKP or the Two Tailed Dog Party)** support has not changed since the summer, 4 percent of the whole population

and 6 percent of the party voters would vote for MKKP, giving them just enough support to enter the Parliament. The support of smaller parties has not undergone significant changes.



When it comes to party support, September has proven to be an interesting month. The rate of decided voters has risen by 5 percentage points and so has the rate of undecided voters. More people would cast a vote than before, but more are unsure which party to vote for. That indicates that compared to the previous month, the composition of both the group of decided voters and of party voters has somewhat changed. That is understandable, as Fidesz has started a full-scale attack with the “Tisza-tax” campaign, while the government parties have been shaken by the “uncle Zsolti” scandal and the unfolding Hatvanpuszta-case. All these topics are suitable for mobilising the voters, but also for discouraging the party voters. Taking all these into account, the party system still seems to be solidifying, Tisza has been ahead of Fidesz-KDNP for months, the summertime zest of the government parties was not enough to get a grip on Péter Magyar’s team, yet the constant scandals around Fidesz-KDNP were also not sufficient to truly shake the support of the reigning parties. Besides the two big parties, Mi Hazánk is the only other party certain to gain a place in the Parliament, as in the past months DK and MKKP have both been performing right around the entry threshold, Kutyapárt is more stagnating, while DK has somewhat weakened recently. The end of the summer and the beginning of the

political season will undoubtedly bring an increasingly harsh campaign. In the meantime Republikon will continue to strive to keep its readers up to date with the latest party preferences.

Methodology: The research was conducted between September 25 and October 1, 2025, through surveying 1,000 people by telephone.

The research is representative of the adult population of the country by gender, age, level of education, and type of settlement.

Margin of error: +/- 3,5%.
