

# Party support


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


## RESULTS


- Party preferences changed relatively little at the beginning of the year. Tisza's support among the entire population remained stable, while Fidesz-KDNP's support increased by 1 percentage point. The current score stands at 33% for Tisza and 28% for Fidesz-KDNP, making Tisza's lead 5 percentage points. Among party voters, Tisza maintains 46% support, whereas Fidesz-KDNP's backing has risen by 1 percentage point to 28%, resulting in Tisza holding an 18-point advantage. However, within specific voter groups, Tisza's lead has decreased within the margin of error. Tisza dropped by 1 percentage point, and Fidesz-KDNP's support increased by 2 percentage points, giving Tisza a narrower lead of 9 percentage points. The new year has brought about an even more intense campaign, with Fidesz and the pro-government media aggressively promoting the theme of war, which helped the ruling party secure victory in 2022. Within their campaign, beyond the threat of mortal danger and the potential outbreak of World War III, the war's economic implications have become more prominent, reflecting the poor economic conditions and shifting the blame from the government that has been in power for 16 years. Voter turnout has shifted somewhat, as fewer voters are willing to cast their ballots compared to the end of last year. This trend currently benefits Fidesz but has not altered the long-term trend or Tisza's overall advantage.




- **Mi Hazánk's** support has remained consistent since the beginning of the year, with approximately 4% of the total population and 6% of party voters indicating they would vote for the party. Currently, their support is hovering around the parliamentary threshold and has a chance of gaining seats. However, as the election approaches, voters are increasingly leaning towards the two major parties. Therefore, Mi Hazánk can't be considered a guaranteed winner, especially if it fails to clearly differentiate its messages from those of the ruling parties.



- The **Kutyapárt** has the support of approximately 4% of the total population, as well as 5% of its party voters and certain voter demographics. It is exactly on the threshold of entering parliament and will need to draw more attention to itself to enhance its chances. Notably, among all its previous attempts, this is the closest the party has come to securing a seat in parliament.



- The support for the **DK (Democratic Coalition)** aligns the closest with that of the Kutyapárt, holding 3% of the total population and 4% among party voters. Some demographics indicate they would consider voting for DK. While this level of support suggests that the party might not currently secure a seat in parliament, there remains a possibility for it to gain entry in the future.



The smaller parties' opportunity to gain more support has been completely restricted to the final stages of the election campaign, with no other party currently achieving 1 percent support. The proportion of undecided voters is at 27%.

**Methodology:** The survey was conducted between January 15 and 20, 2026, with 1,000 people interviewed by telephone. The survey is not representative of the adult population of the country in terms of age, educational attainment, and type of settlement. The margin of error is +/- 3.5%.
