
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
## RESULTS

If parliamentary elections were held this Sunday, a four-party parliament would likely be formed, with Tisza, Fidesz–KDNP, Mi Hazánk, and the Two-Tailed Dog Party entering the National Assembly. In February, party preferences changed only within the margin of error. The Tisza Party continues to hold a stable lead over the governing parties. The balance of power between the two major parties remains unchanged. However, the overall field is narrowing: the proportion of undecided voters has noticeably decreased, and support for smaller parties has also declined. These voters have shifted primarily to the two major parties.


Among the total population, Tisza leads Fidesz–KDNP by 5 percentage points, with support at 35 percent compared to 30 percent. Among decided voters, Tisza's lead is 7 percentage points: 46 percent would vote for Tisza, while 39 percent support Fidesz–KDNP. Among likely voters, Tisza stands at 47 percent and Fidesz–KDNP at 39 percent, giving Tisza an 8-percentage-point advantage in this group.




Mi Hazánk (Our Homeland) has 5 percent support among the total population, 7 percent among decided voters, and 6 percent among likely voters. If parliamentary elections were held this Sunday, the party would enter parliament.




Kutyapárt (MKKP or Two Tailed Dog Party) has 4 percent support among the total population, and 5 percent among both decided voters and likely voters. At present, the party would narrowly enter parliament.




DK is supported by 2 percent of the total population and 3 percent among both decided voters and likely voters; it would not enter parliament.



The ratio of undecided voters decreased by 4 percentage points to 23 percent, representing the most significant shift compared to January. As the elections approach, 77 percent of the total population state that they would turn out to vote in April.





**Methodology:** The survey was conducted via telephone interviews with a sample of 1,000 respondents between 12 and 17 February 2026. The sample is representative of the adult population of Hungary by gender, age, level of education, and type of settlement. Margin of error: +/- 3.5%.

Decided voters are respondents who indicate a party preference.

Likely voters are respondents who report that they are certain to participate in the election.
